Herbert Bradbury's legacy is still protecting the paths he loved so much

In 1959, Mr Bradbury left £1,500 on trust for erecting and maintaining signposts on public paths within a six-mile radius of Cheltenham Post Office. Today, walkers continue to benefit from his far-sightedness.

Jack Candy is still defending the commons he loved

Jack Candy was an active defender of commons and open spaces in Southampton. Thanks to his legacy, we have created a new post of commons re-registration officer, enabling us to research commons which are eligible for registration in nine pioneer areas in England. Once registered the land is protected from encroachment and development.

Colin Bennett's gift is ensuring future research

Thanks to Colin Bennett, who has made us a significant gift in his lifetime, we have been able to pass some more recent archives to the Museum of English Rural Life in Reading (MERL) and provide the resources for them to employ a professional to catalogue and publicise them.
